Writing in the literacy realm may play the biggest role in determining how successful your children will be and how fast they will progress through a given curriculum. Parents can take their kids into the yard, meadows, woods or if you are lucky enough to live along a creek and have great interactions with the myriad of nature's delights that surround you. Questions can be asked and topics created that your child can journal about. Tell me about the prettiest flower in the meadow or what is your favorite colored rock in the creek and write a short paragraph about it. Nature can provide some of the best writing topics. Just ask Robert Frost. Naturalistic themes can provide some of the best conversation that you can have with your child and what an amazing way to spend some time with your family.

Another activity you can do in a naturalistic setting with your child is work on vocabulary. You can text your child words and have them tell you what the word is and what it means. This is a fantastic way to grow vocabulary with a 21st century flair. Amy Burzanko does this with her preschool son at McDonald's. As they are eating, she sends her son Ryan words that he will identify for her. What an awesome way to grow vocabulary. This would be a great way to journal as well. Electronic journals can be a way of getting your child to write. Electronic

portfolios can also be used, as folders of work can be saved and organized to review at a later date as together, you as a family can remark on the progress that your child has made writing.

Activities that you can share with your child in an educational setting can enhance learning while sharing precious family time can be some of the greatest memories you can make with your kids while complementing learning moments. Family time can have many faces and there is no better face than a daisy in the meadow, a fish in the creek or a violet on the edge of the woods.
